Other species of animals, whethewild or domestic, trained or untrained are not service animals for the purposes of this definition. RESPONSIBILITIES OF OWNER

- Registering with the Office of Accessibility is recommen@exthe best interest of the student and the servic animal.
- The University of Akron recommends keepiidentification on the service animal, such as a harness, for t safety of the service animal and others.
- The University is not responsible for the careluding feeding and toileting) or supervision of aviate animal. A service animal shall be under control of its handler. A service animal shall have a harness, leash or othe unless either the handler is unable because of a disability to use a harness, leash or other tether, or the harness or other tether would interfere with the service animal's safe, effective performance of wo tasks, in which case the service animal must be otherwise under the handler's control (e.g., voice control, or other effective means).

In addition, any damages caused by animal (e.g., room furnishings, roommated ongings, common areace) will be the reponsibility of the owner contracted for University ousing. The owner is financially responsible for all injury or damage to persons or property, including other animals, caused by their animal. The owner is reto clean up after and properly dispose of the animal's waste in a safe and sanitary manner and, when provide animal relief areas designated by the University. An individual with a disability evfiltancially responsible for any damage caused by his or her animal beyond reasonable wear and tear to the same e it holds other individuals financially responsible for damages beyond reasonable wear and tear. The owner's space may also be inspected for fleas, ticks or other pests if necessary as part of the University of the same and beyond standard pest management in the residence halls. The U shall have the right to charge the owner's University student account for any unmet financial obligations to the University under this provision.

OUT OF CLASSROOM EXPERIENCES

- There may be instaes in internship/cop/clinical experiences when the service animal may not be permitted accompany the student. Though service animals can accompany their handler almost anywhere the hand they maybe excluded from areas where their presence would constitute a fundamental alteration, an burden, or a direct threat to safety.
- Examples of settings where service animals may be excluded in **blutder**e not limited to sterile environments (such as operating rooms, some ICU rooms, some delivery rooms), clean rooms where microchip manufactured, places where bis prepared, and open air zoological exhibits.
- If the service animal is properly excluded, the individual with a disability has the opportunity to participate i
 service, program or activity without having the service animal on the premises.
- Students are encouraged to contact theampus and onite coordinator for the out of classroom experience to discuss any limitations the service animal may have on site.

TRAINING SERVICE ANIMALS

• Any individual training a service animal on campus must meet the requirem Offic drevised Code § 955.43.

EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

- To help ensure appropriatesponse, these guidelines are being disstandinta The University Police and Environmental and Occupational Health and Salationartmeth
- In the event of emergencewacuationit is recommended for the owner to have a kennel or crate and a disa kit including food and water for the servianimal.
- During a disaster, animals will accompany their owners to the designated safe area.
- University of Akron and/or emergency responders are not responsible for the removal of the ESA in emer situations.

GRIEVANCE

• The University of Akron has the sole discretion on safety matters related to service animals.
